Three freshmen were also awarded CHS Foundation Scholarships through the College of Agriculture at Kansas State University: Rylan Karr of Saint Charles, Illinois, freshman in agribusiness; Madelyn King, North Java, New York, freshman in agribusiness; and Audrey Jones of Wichita, Kansas, freshman in agribusiness.

Samantha Bonifas is a highly involved student who has been active in Food Security Scholars, College of Agriculture Ambassadors, Student Alumni Board, Pre-Law Ambassadors and Kansas Corn Collegiate Academy. She is also a Flinchbaugh Kansas Agriculture and Food Policy Fellow. Samantha has interned with the Kansas Department of Agriculture as well as at a congressional office in Washington D.C.. She has also worked as a research and teaching assistant for Dr. Jason Bergtold in the K-State Department of Agricultural Economics. Samantha plans to pursue an ag law degree after graduation. "The CHS Foundation Scholarships are one way the CHS Foundation is giving back to future agricultural leaders at Kansas State University," states Professor Brian Briggeman, director of the Arthur Capper Cooperative Center. The CHS Foundation, funded by gifts from CHS Inc., the nation's leading farmer-owned cooperative, has awarded \$251,850 in scholarships through the Arthur Capper Cooperative Center in the Department of Agricultural Economics at Kansas State University since 2006.

To be eligible for the scholarship, the students must be U.S. citizens or legal residents properly enrolled as a freshman, sophomore, junior or senior during the current academic year majoring in an agriculture-focused or ag-related STEM undergraduate program. Recipients must demonstrate academic ability and exhibit leadership qualities through the university, community or ag industry involvement. Priority is given to students demonstrating an interest in agriculture-based cooperatives. Continuing K-State students are encouraged to fill out the K-State scholarship application to be included in the university scholarship process for the 2026-2027 academic year.

The awarding of the CHS Foundation Scholarships is coordinated through the Arthur Capper Cooperative Center. “Additional contributions by those who want to support the purposes of cooperative scholarships are welcome,” Dr. Briggeman said.
